Continuing my experimentation. I played with the inverting of the colours from white to black and so forth. Quite an interesting play.

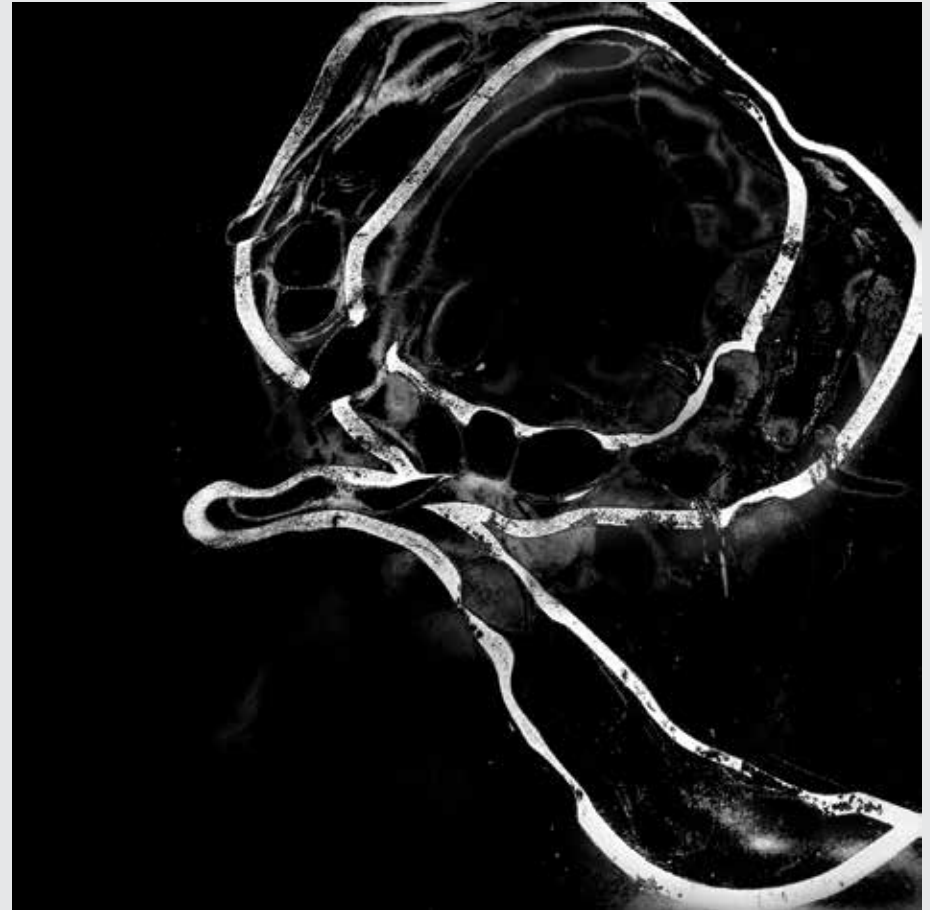
Task 1: Type as image (FINAL)

Task 3: Type as Emotion (**Process**)

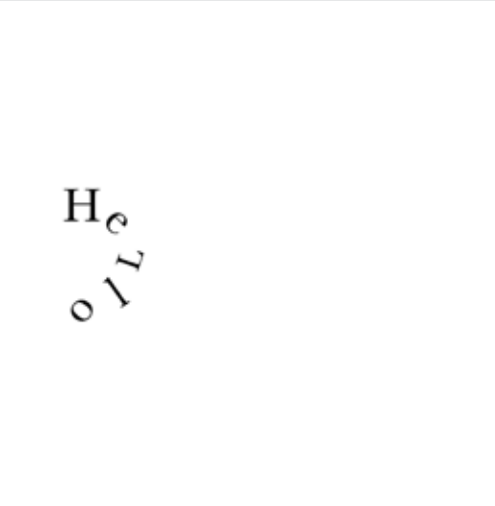

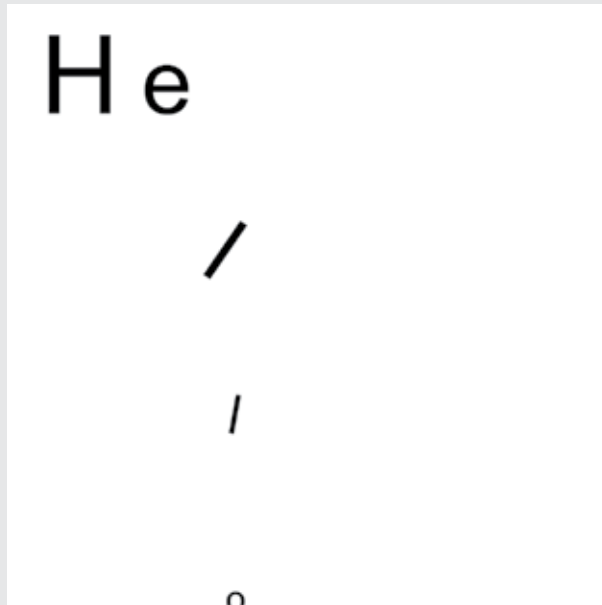

Again trying with different families of Arial. I also tried playing with the scale. The size of each letter being different gave a very different outcome each time.

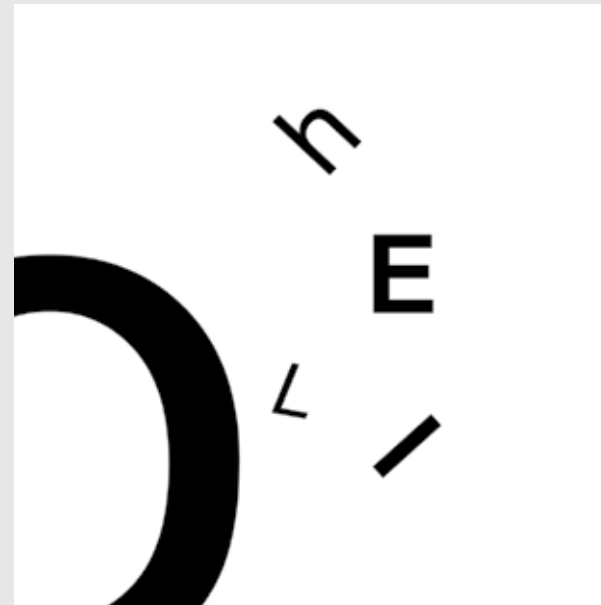
At the end, I decided on using Arial for my task 3.

1. Bored
