Race: Others
Sales: 20% of 2019 Sales
Non-Mandarin Speaker



Candidate 2: Charlene
Race: Chinese
Sales: 35% of 2019 Sales
Mandarin Speaker

The top two trading partners of Singapore are China and Hong Kong. Therefore, the biggest portion of sales usually go to your Mandarin-speaking employees since they are able to converse better with these partners.

All players are to assume the roles stated below accordingly.

EIP: Ethnic Integration Policy
To preserve Singapore's multi-cultural identity & promote racial integration and harmony. It ensures that there is a balanced mix of the various ethnic communities in HDB towns.


With that, assume the roles below according to your race chips.



Housing Agent



House Buyer



House Sellers

Currently, the Chinese quota has maxed out while the Malay and Indian & Others are lacking in residents.

EIP Quota in HDB estates

Chinese	Malay	Indian & Others
87%	25%	15%

Since the Chinese quota needs to be freed up, the Chinese Seller may sell above valuation price while the Malay Seller may need to sell at valuation price as the property needs to be released to another minority to fill up the already lack in quota.

As a housing agent, keeping your House Sellers, House Buyer & your own profits in mind, would you sell the cheaper or more expensive unit?

DOUBLE-BARRELLED RACE

Regardless of which race chip you are holding, at this PIT STOP, assume that you were born in a mixed race family where your IC states a double-barrelled race of Indian-Chinese.

In Singapore, only your first race stated in the IC will be considered.

Suppose you're buying an HDB flat. As we've learnt in PIT STOP 3, there is an EIP Quota for HDBs as stated below.

Indian & Others

Indian & Others are classified under the same category with a shared & combined quota percentage.

Therefore, given this situation, would you change your IC to Chinese-Indian instead to stand a better chance in getting placement in your favoured HDB Estate?

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PIT STOP 5

EDUCATION PATHWAY

Players are to assume the role of a parent who has a child enrolling into Primary 1 at this PIT STOP. You are required to make the decision based on the race chip you are holding.

*SAP or Special Assistance Plan schools: Cater to academically inclined students excelling in both their mother tongue and the English language.

Currently, the only other tongue offered in SAP schools is Mandarin. Several subjects may also be taught in Mandarin, alongside other subjects taught in English.

Apart from that, the SAP exists to preserve traditional Chinese values and nurture bilingualism.

Therefore, being in a SAP school would mean that your child would need to take mandarin as their second language.

Given your race on the chip, would you then consider placing your child in a SAP school or would you enrol your child in a neighbourhood school?
